
Plato's Ideal World



- Plato believed that there are perfect forms of "things" but these "things" are not visible. These "ideal" forms exist in their purist form possible and they are unchanging.
- Plato imagined that there exists an ideal or perfect world beyond our own physical earth. The idea is that our earth is full of imperfections which have been copied from the true ideal world which is beyond us. (Is he hinting at heaven?)
- Ex) Ideal circle = the perfect circle exists in a world outside our world of existence and it sets the model for all circles.

- Plato used the term "form" to indicate the essence of any particular object. He believed a form for every particular item exists. This world of perfect forms can only be reached through pure thought rather than the senses.
- He believed that an "ideal human being" also exists.
- The highest form is that of "goodness". To reach this ultimate realization is only through pure thought.
- According to Plato, the goal is to look beyond the changing surface of things to see the unchanging and timeless essence of forms.

- Plato believed two distinct levels of reality existed: Realm of Opinion (visible world) and Realm of Knowledge (intelligible world)
- Theory of Forms deals with both metaphysics and epistomology.
